Happy Spring, by the time you receive this newsletter I am hoping that the weather has turned, and we will see no more snow. But sometimes mother nature has April surprises for us. I want to thank our highway and parks employees for the many hours spent this winter plowing and sanding our roads, parks parking lots and sidewalks. This year like in the past many of you left comments on social media, my email or wrote letters thanking them for their hard work.

What does spring bring? Road construction, new homes being built and of course applications for sheds, fences and pools. See the building department comments on the best way to apply for a permit. In the highway department comments you will learn of the planned work on our town roads this summer, and the parks department will be preparing all our parks for your use. Grove Park will get a second new baseball backstop this year Victor Little League will be using both fields. We have purchased new soccer goals for both fields at Beaver Creek Park this should result in more field use than in past years.

Wood Drive Bridge replacement: We hope to make an award in early April so that construction could start in late May or early June. Most bidders say there is a delay in getting the structure material for the bridge and this may delay opening the bridge until the spring of 2027. We will update you in our next newsletter.

E-Bikes, Trail Bikes, Scooters and Golf Carts: We have had many complaints about E-bikes and such using the Auburn Trail, our Town Parks and sidewalks mostly by juveniles. **Parents This must stop, get your children to understand the DMV rules and our Town Restrictions.** Most operators are underage, not wearing a helmet, no lights and are speeding everywhere they go. Farmington is reviewing our Town Code and will have a Public Hearing, hopefully in April. Then the Town Board will approve the changes to our code for all operators to abide by. I look forward to any suggestions as we go through the process to improve safety and add restrictions that can be enforced by law enforcement.

Water & Sewer Rates – Maintenance of our water & sewer infrastructure is very expensive. Again, this year we have raised water and sewer rates starting on January 1st of this year.

HUNTING AND FISHING LICENSES

Hunting licenses and tags can be obtained through the Town Clerk's Office during regular business hours. A schedule of fees for NY State can be found at: <https://www.eregulations.com/newyork/hunting/license-fees>

Turkey Season: May 1, 2026 – May 31, 2026

General Regulations

- You may buy only one turkey permit per year, which includes three carcass tags, two for spring and one for fall.
- If you have filled your bag limit, you may call turkeys for another hunter, but you may not carry a bow, crossbow, or firearm. You may call turkeys to aid another hunter only if you are licensed to hunt wild turkey in New York State and have a valid turkey permit.
- If you have taken a turkey that is unfit for consumption, authorized DEC staff may issue a special permit to take another. You will have to surrender the carcass. Call your wildlife or law enforcement office.

BACKTAGS

As a result of a law change, backtags are no longer required while hunting anywhere in New York State. You must carry valid proof of your license(s), privilege(s), permit(s), and all applicable tags. Valid proof of license(s), privilege(s), permit(s) includes: print out on 8.5" x 11" paper, digital copy, or electronic license in HuntFishApp. Carcass tags must be printed on 8.5" x 11" paper. You must be able to fill out your paper tag upon harvest. Attaching a new plain paper tag to

your harvest: cut the appropriate tax from the sheet of paper, upon harvesting, fill in the tag with the information and sign it, place the tag in a weatherproof case or bag, and attach to the animal, keeping the tag visible. Examples of weatherproof casings: reusable sandwich bag, reusable plastic tag holder, an ID holder, or a plastic sandwich bag.

Additional Information:

- Be sure to check the regulations and guidelines provided by the Department of Fish and Wildlife. Understanding local rules will ensure a safe and enjoyable hunting experience.
- All hunters, both new and seasoned, are encouraged to review the <https://dec.ny.gov/things-to-do/hunting/turkey/regulations> before heading out into the field.

PAPER SHREDDING:

The Ontario County Department of Sustainability and Solid Waste Management has provided a bin for residents to place paper in for shredding. It is located in between the two doors at the entrance to the town hall and will be available during the town's normal business hours.

Please note the following rules for usage:

Only residential generated paper is accepted (no businesses are allowed).

Paper must be loose and can not already be shredded

Binder clips must be removed

Staples and paperclips are okay to leave it.

No other materials are allowed in the bin.

Only one legal box of material per month per house is allowed.

Bin remains locked and once the material is placed in the bin, it can not be retrieved.

Pre-registering makes check-in faster. Pets are vaccinated in the order they arrive. Please be prepared to wait. For your safety and your pet's, do not arrive before 8:45 a.m. Bring proof of prior rabies vaccination for a 3-year certificate, without proof, a 1-year certificate will be issued. Dogs must be on a sturdy, non-retractable leashes. Cats must be in secure carriers, one cat per carrier. Please limit to four animals per handler. Clinics are free of charge. Donations are welcome and appreciated.

It is ultimately your responsibility as the homeowner to be sure a permit has been applied for and approved PRIOR to starting any work.

NEW PROCESS TO GET BUILDING PERMITS!!!!

The Town is excited to let you know that you will be able to apply, pay, and pick up your permit online. With that said you will be able to go to the Town website, <https://farmingtonny.gov/>, which has a link to set up an account to apply for any permit that is required by the Town. There is also an area where you can submit a complaint that you would like the Town to investigate. Lastly, the same portal will allow you to set up inspections for your projects on your schedule.

To apply for a building permit:

1. Go to the Town of Farmington website. <https://farmingtonny.gov/>
2. Click on departments and go to building/ planning/ zoning.
3. Click apply for a building permit at the top of the page.
4. Select whichever application suits the project you are doing the best.

To pay for a building permit:

1. After the permit has been approved you will receive an email with an invoice attached.

2. On the bottom of the invoice there is a "click here" button that will take you to the payment processor.

To check on building permit status:

1. Go to the Town of Farmington website.

2. Click on departments and go to building/ planning/ zoning.
3. Click apply for a building permit at the top of the page.
4. Scroll down on this page and find the "Search or pay for an existing permit"
5. Once here you can search by permit number, parcel address, contractor, etc.
6. You can pay for the permit and requests inspection at this screen as well.



From the Assessor's Office

Hello Farmington Property Owners and Happy Spring!

In December of 2025 the Governor signed a bill to allow for a disability exemption for veterans with a 100 percent disability rating. Subsequently, a chapter amendment was signed into law in February 2026 which made exemption mandatory with no local option. The amendment also established that it would become effective for the 2027 assessment roll.

This is not a blanket exemption for all veterans with a 100% disability rating. Despite public perception, the law does not provide a total exemption for all veterans receiving a 100% disability compensation rating from the VA.

To qualify, a veteran must meet all the criteria below and provide proof that they meet each qualification. The exemption application form and instructions are not published as of yet but should be available in early fall.

- Have a qualifying condition under NYS Veterans Services Law, defined as:
 - Post Traumatic Stress Disorder or
 - Traumatic Brain Injury or
 - Military Sexual Trauma or
 - Be a discharged LGBT Veteran with an other than dishonorable or bad conduct discharge **and**
- Have a 100% disability rating with a permanent and total designation from the VA **and**
- Have a total disability based on individual unemployability **and**
- Qualify for the VA's specially adapted housing grant

Following up from the last newsletter on some frequently asked questions regarding assessments and taxes, one common question is how does my homes market value affect my property taxes? In general terms, property taxes are based on the estimated market value of your home. As I have mentioned before, sales in the Town of Farmington continue to be very strong. When arriving at the market value for your home, I typically use the sales comparison approach. By either emailing me or calling our office, we are

happy to send you arms length sales that are used to arrive at market value. Do your research and if, after reviewing the sales, you conclude that the market value of your property is too high, contact my office to set up an informal meeting. Bring your research into the meeting. We will discuss how I arrived at market value as well as the research you have done. If you remain unsatisfied with the assessment, you have the right to a formal administrative and judicial review. My office can give you further information on these processes.

Highway Department

With the end of this long winter in sight, we are all welcoming the coming of Spring, and with this comes the start of the upcoming construction season.

To start off the season, the Highway Department, will be doing our annual version of spring cleaning, by walking all the Town's open roads to remove garbage from the roadside. This not only is to improve the look of driving country roads, it reduces pollution, mitigates debris, and obstructions from roadside mowing, and can help identify drainage issues.

When the temperatures rise, there will be crews out to repair lawn damage with topsoil and grass seed. I truly understand the frustration and inconvenience this can cause and apologize. Restoration will begin when the weather breaks. There isn't a need to notify the Town of yard damage, as we will be going down each road in due time.

As of the time of this writing, the Wood Drive bridge is out for bid. The Pintail Crossing road dedication process is underway. The Cranberry Drive project will resume shortly. Additionally asphalt plants tentatively open mid-April or the beginning of May depending on the temperature.

With that said, the Highway Department will also be preparing for our road projects this summer. 4.51 miles of chip sealing will be applied to Crowley Road, New Michigan Road and Collett Road from Hook Road to County Road 8. Mill and Fill projects include Collett Road from Mertensia Road to Rt. 332, Estate Drive, Chelsea Place, and Stonefield Lane. We are awaiting core samples for Collett Road from Rt. 332 to Hook Road to determine the extent of the work to be performed. Collett Road from County Road 8 to County Road 28 will get a 2" overlay to cap the road. Finally the last scheduled project will be a fiber mat treatment for Hook Road from Rt. 96 to Curran Road where last year's treatment concluded.

2026 Spring Town Clean Up: 420 Hook Road at the Town Transfer Station. Thursday and Friday, May 7th and 8th 8:00

AM to 6:00 PM, Saturday, May 9th 8:00 AM to 3:00 PM. The document shredding service will be provided once again on Saturday, May 9th from 9 AM until 12:00 PM.

I would like to conclude with thanking the men for their hard work, long hours and missed time with family. Without them we wouldn't have the quality of roads we do. I would also like to thank all Residents of Farmington, for your patience this winter, along with your support and feedback. Without you, us public servants would not have an area to serve. As your new Highway Superintendent all of our collective safety is my top priority. Please, be mindful out there. The road, is "our" office. Drive safe.



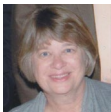
Parks Department

Town Historian

Dear Readers:

As my last letter to you as your town historian, I wish to share some history of a project which benefited our community of military personnel and our town. In 2013, a National program was developed by the Department of Defense to commemorate the anniversary of the Vietnam War with a focus on acknowledging the ones who served and their families who supported them. Every organization and township were invited to join the National program with a three year commitment and a guarantee to hold three annual events to honor of the veterans. Nationwide, 13000 partnerships of the program were setup including the Town of Farmington as the Vietnam Veterans Commemorative Committee (VWCC). Members were Michelle Finley, Barb Years, Cathy Post, Rosalie Fafinski, Karen Ford, Jeremy

Marshall and myself as chair. Throughout our 3 year commitment a few others would join or leave. We began with no funds, a veteran inventory of over 200 veterans living in Farmington and a commitment that no monies would be accepted from our veterans. Fundraising began.

The first year we held monthly "Brown Bag Lunch" day at the Mertensia Lodge for the veterans. Committee members donated dessert snacks and coffee while the veterans sat and talked amongst themselves. (Did you know that veterans are particularly fond of brownies!) Our veterans were the greatest source for advertising. On August 24, 2014, the VWCC held a long overdue "Welcome Home" event in the Town park for Vietnam War veterans with guest speakers, public and State officials and military organizations from Ontario, Wayne and Monroe counties attending. Food and other refreshments, tents, chairs, music, flags and media apparatus was donated. The Patriot Riders surrounded the perimeter of nearly 300 veterans and their families! I still catch my breath thinking of that day!

In 2015 an invitational only pig roast was held at no cost to the veterans and their families. Again, all food and tableware was donated. Committee members roasted the pig and served. Monthly veteran gatherings were moved to the Town Hall and the Legacy at Fairways donated luncheon food. The VWCC voted to fundraise for a veteran memorial. The town board passed a resolution to build it on town property. Midway in the year, we lost two of our original committee members as they established an Amvets chapter. Two new members were added. Luncheons and fundraising continued.

In 2016, the Legacy held a Memorial Benefit Concert Program to raise funds for the memorial. A grant from NYS, numerous donations and brick sales added to the memorial fund. Luncheons continued. Stone and design for the memorial was approved and selected by the VWCC.

In 2017, Mark Wyman (Country Care Landscaping) constructed the memorial. It included engraved bricks and a commemorative bronze plaque. Pavers were planted in silicone to hinder weed growth for very little maintenance. Total cost was roughly \$17,000. Labor was donated. In September the VWCC hosted a dedication event for the memorial.

Shortly after the memorial dedication and before the VWCC disbanded, a grant check was received from Rotary. The funds allowed for electric installation to the flag poles and provided new flags for the next eight years!

In 2025, the Department of Defense recognized the town of Farmington as ranking in the top 15% of the National program among 13000 partners. The VWCC had gone beyond what was expected of the partners!

The VWCC was comprised of people who fulfilled their partnership duties for no other reason than wanting to give back to our community of veterans. Each time I drive by the Memorial, I feel pride for working with these individuals and what we accomplished for our town.

In closing, please know that I have enjoyed serving as your town historian – the years have gone much too fast. Hopefully, I will see you at the South Farmington Historic Chapel events– another love of mine!

Water & Sewer Department

Hello Farmington residents and Happy Spring! After a long and more traditional New York State winter season we at Water & Sewer are anxious for longer days and warmer weather. Our field staff have been busy so far this year repairing a number of watermain breaks, replacing water meters and preparing equipment and materials for Spring projects. The treatment plant operators are busy with various operations & maintenance tasks and, with department management, are currently preparing for our annual facility inspection by the NYSDEC at our wastewater treatment plant (WWTP). Lastly, office staff is busy preparing our 2025 Annual Water Quality Report.

The Brickyard Road Water Storage Tank Project is nearly complete with only site restoration, fencing and paving remaining before project closeout. Our engineers are working on the design to replace a portion of the aging watermain at the south end of County Road 8. They have also recently begun design work for a significant capital improvement project at our WWTP. This project will replace our original, failing filtration system with modern, higher efficiency and a smaller footprint system fully capable of handling the flows we currently have and anticipate in the future. The project scope will also address several other needs around the WWTP.

In a previous article I provided you with some insight/information on the system of piping & pumpstations that convey sewage to the WWTP and a lesson on how the WWTP works to treat the sewage making it safe for discharge. I would like to now spend some time providing you with some basic information on the water system we operate & maintain to provide you with safe drinking water. The Town of Farmington purchases its drinking water from the City of Canandaigua through 3 metered connections near the northern Canandaigua city line. Water is moved throughout our system solely by gravity, there are no pumps providing pressure in the Canandaigua-Farmington Water District! Elevation and the change in elevation from south to north across our system provide the energy to move the water throughout the distribution system.

Our system includes 2 water storage tanks, 9 pressure reducing valve (PRV) vaults, approximately 150 miles of watermain, over 2700 valves and nearly 1200 fire hydrants. The afore mentioned Brickyard Road tank is in the southern portion of the system with a second tank in the northern part of the system near the intersection of Brownsville and Weigert Roads. These storage tanks primarily provide reserve capacity in the event of a large fire. The PRV vaults are scattered throughout our system and maintain system pressure at safe levels for our distribution piping and for your homes piping and water using appliances.

The many miles of watermain and numerous valves/hydrants keep our staff very busy with various repairs and maintenance activities. Like many communities in our

Country, we have a significant amount of piping that is aging and nearing the end of its useful life, necessitating replacement. The replacement of miles of pipe is very expensive and requires both careful planning/phasing and adequate budget & funding opportunities. Public infrastructure, especially water and sewer infrastructure, is often overlooked and undervalued. I would urge all of you to contact your local, state and federal elected officials and urge them to support, increase funding to and create new programs aimed toward assisting communities with upgrading and replacing the critical infrastructure we all rely on every day. Without an influx of capital from State and Federal government agencies it is very difficult for any community to address aging infrastructure before it becomes a problem. Please be a mouthpiece to help us keep your toilets flushing and tap water flowing!

As always, please stay off your cell phones while driving. Slow down, move over and be alert when encountering our crews, first responders or construction activity along the road; our lives depend on it! Please keep your contact information up to date/current with the Water & Sewer Department. If we do not have a current phone number or email address, we are unable to contact you in the event of an emergency. Planning & Development

Public Infrastructure Grant Award...

The Town of Farmington has received notice that our grant application for one million dollars of State Economic Development Infrastructure Funds has been chosen by the County Board of Supervisors for this year's submission to the Genesee/Finger Lakes Regional Economic Development Council. The project includes construction of a sanitary sewer force main, from Pump Station No.1, located at Finger Lakes Gaming and Racing, down the east side of Beaver Creek Road connecting to the Town's large interceptor sewer line. It also includes construction of a much shorter section of sanitary sewer line from along the west side of Mertensia Road north connecting to the interceptor sewer line and replacement of pump station equipment and electrical wiring at Pump Station No.1. The design and cost estimates have been completed for this project and construction of these improvements should begin this fall.

E-Bike regulations...

The Town Board will begin the formal legal process for amending the Town Code creating a new Chapter 77 regulating E-Bikes, Mopeds and other non-licensed motorized vehicles prohibiting their use on public sidewalks, the Auburn Trail Extension, the Hickory Rise Conservation Trail and town parklands. These regulations do not replace the regulations contained in the State's Department Motor Vehicle Laws.

The need for Town regulations are in response to numerous complaints from town residents citing damage to their properties, near mishaps between these vehicles and pedestrians and a need for regulations to impose penalties for convictions. Public hearings on these regulations will be scheduled later this spring.

Accessory Structures regulations...

The Town Board will also begin the formal legal process for amending the existing provisions in Chapter 165 of the Town Code, the Town Zoning Law, creating new regulations for accessory structures, including private garages, in all zoning districts. The current one size allowed for an accessory structure applies to all zoning districts and does not provide consideration for the different minimum lot sizes in the Zoning Law. A moratorium is being considered by the Town Board which, if enacted, would prohibit building permits from being issued in certain instances. The moratorium may go into effect this spring and end later this summer.

Town Projects Under Review...

1. Cook Properties Incentive Zoning Plan.

The Town Planning Board continues their review of the Overall Preliminary Subdivision Plat and Overall Preliminary Site Plan applications for the proposed mix use development of the approximately 65 acres of land comprising the "Farmington Meadows Incentive Zoning Project." The project is located along the east side of State Route 332, between the New York State Police Troop E Headquarters and County Road 41. The Planning Board has continued the public hearing on these two applications to Wednesday April 1, 2026. The conceptual rendering of this project is shown below.



2. Farmington Volunteer Fire Association, Special Use Permit & Preliminary Site Plan Applications, Fire Station No. 2, Building Expansion and Site Improvements...

The Town Planning Board, at their meeting on March 18th opened and continued two public hearings, one for a special use permit and one for preliminary site plan approval, for the construction of a building addition to the existing fire station and remodeling of the interior of said building.

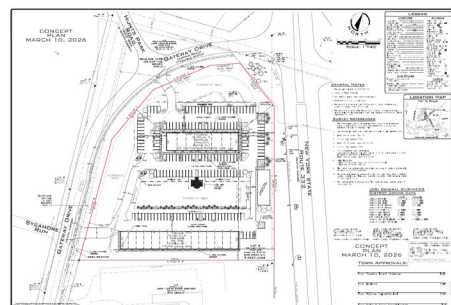
The existing fire station is 50-years old, and the planned improvements are required to be made to meet federal and state fire fighter safety regulations, and to accommodate fire equipment that now just barely fits within the existing fire station. The existing 5,000 square foot building is to be remodeled, and the proposed expansion includes a 12,830 square feet new building area. Other site improvements include installation of a new larger parking lot and multiple driveways that delineate traffic movements and parking between public and emergency vehicles, utility improvements, a geothermal system, stormwater management facilities, and lighting and landscaping improvements.

Below is a conceptual building elevation drawing [taken from Hook Road looking east] of the fire station improvements.



3. Thruway Flex Building and Mixed-Use Project...

The Town Planning Board and the Town Project Review Committee met in early March to discuss a proposed concept plan design for a 5-acre parcel of land located at the southwest corner of the intersection of State Route 332 and Gateway Drive. There are two buildings and related site improvements proposed for this site. One is a Flex Building design similar to the two Flex Buildings located at the southwest corner of the intersection of Loomis Road and Plastermill Road. The second building is a 3-story structure with proposed neighborhood commercial uses on the first floor and apartments on the second and third floors. The Planning Board will be receiving preliminary site plans at their meeting on April 1, 2026.

Town Projects Under Construction...

1. Victor-Farmington Volunteer Ambulance Corps.

Contractors continue making interior renovations to the existing building and recently began site excavating for the construction of the three (3) bay garage for ambulances. The Ambulance Station No. 2 facility is located at the southwest corner of State Route 96 and County Road 8. They are tentatively scheduled to be operating this fall from this new facility.

2. Villager Construction Project...

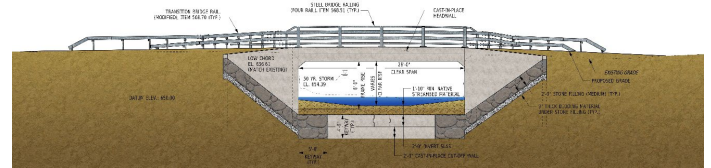
Construction of a private road, with public water lines and sewer lines, along with the pads for the two proposed buildings and on-site parking is underway on property north of Loomis Road and adjacent to I-90, the New York State Thruway. The photo below identifies the construction underway of approximately an 9,000 square foot single-story maintenance building. There will also be a 38,600 square foot, single-story, office building and on-site parking for employees, customers and guests, site lighting, landscaping and other related site improvements.



Other Town Projects soon to start construction...

Wood Drive Bridge Replacement Project and travel restrictions... Fisher Associates, has received authorization to solicit formal bidding for this bridge replacement project. Bid openings were March 19, 2026, awarding the contract for the bridge construction shortly thereafter. Construction is tentatively scheduled to begin this summer and be completed in 2027.

Finally, traffic movements across the Wood Drive Bridge continue to be restricted to One-Way-In-Only, with the entrance from County Road 41, along with the posting of a ten-ton weight restriction. Traffic continues not to be allowed to exit from Wood Drive onto County Road 41. Law enforcement agencies continue patrolling the area and tickets continue to be issued to those motorists violating this reduced movement across the bridge.
